November 30 Advent by Candlelight Dear Members and Friends.

I recently heard a description of generative AI that helps me make sense of it. Training AI requires devouring millions of examples of writing and artwork. But what it produces is not necessarily the right answer. Instead, it is designed to give something that looks like what you expect the answer to look like.

(That it has used so many people's writings and artwork without attribution or compensation is problematic and unethical. But that is not the point here.)

This means that it does not necessarily give correct information, but it can make it look convincing. People who have used it for research have discovered that it will cite studies that do not exist, as if they were written by people who do exist.

It is the definition of facade. It has the veneer of authenticity, even formatting things as if real research had been done. It provides answers that might pass the sniff test, but any digging deeper or critical thinking shows it to be "all hat, no cattle," as they used to say when I was in Texas.

In the season of Thanksgiving, this got me thinking about authenticity. When the New Testament describes what blooms and flourishes when the Holy Spirit is present, it says that the fruit of the Spirit is *love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.* (Galatians 5:22-23) These are qualities that require authenticity. These are not veneer traits. They require some depth of soul, some centeredness of spirit. (See Emily Bass's article in this newsletter about the importance of contemplation and depth of being present to meet the challenges of our day.)

As we give thanks, whatever form that might take, may we do so with authenticity. And may we experience love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control, in the presence of the Holy Spirit.

Faith Formation

Dear Salem Family,

Recent studies continue to affirm what mystics, monks, and poets have long known: contemplative practices shape us for flourishing. In a recent episode of *To the Best of Our Knowledge* on human flourishing, researchers described how meditation, prayer, and mindful attention help us grow in compassion, emotional regulation, and joy. These practices don't remove the pain or uncertainty of our times. They root us more deeply within them. They allow us to hold the ache and the beauty at once, to be more fully human, and to encounter God not above or beyond, but within and among us.

At Contemplative Community, which continues each Friday evening at 6:30PM, we practice just that. Together we create a space to breathe, to listen, and to remember that even now, perhaps especially now, the Spirit moves through the ordinary rhythms of our lives: the flicker of a candle, the shared silence, the turning of seasons.

But what happens when *the ordinary* feels absent? When the familiar patterns of life, community, or faith shift beneath our feet? How do we stay connected to God and one another in times of disorientation or uncertainty?

This **Advent**, we'll explore these questions through Francis Weller's book, *In the Absence of the Ordinary: Soul Work for Times of Uncertainty.* Our time together will be part book discussion and part experiential practice, an invitation to dwell with mystery, grief, and wonder in ways that open us more deeply to the sacred presence that abides even when so much feels undone.

Our journey begins Sunday evening, November 16th (online) and continues throughout Advent. We'll conclude our exploration on the Winter Solstice, the longest night of the year, with a shared meal at Salem, gathered in the glow of candlelight and community. Our **Sunday morning Faith Formation hour at 9AM** will continue this theme as well learning and engaging spiritual practices that nurture grounded presence and resilient hope.

This retreat is always a highlight of the year, a time for laughter, faith exploration, and building friendships rooted in the love of God. If you're in middle school and would like to attend, please let me know! In all these ways, through silence and story, through study and shared meals, through prayer and play, we are being formed. Even in times of uncertainty, perhaps especially then, we are invited to remember: God is here, in the breath, in the pause, in the community gathered and becoming.
